All children can: recognise what happens at the festival of Easter and can talk about their own experiences of celebrations.

Most children can: demonstrate and retell some of the Easter story using rich vocabulary. Children will be able to suggest the meaning behind stories about Holy week.

Some children can: demonstrate and explain Jesus was raised from death using accurate vocabulary. They will also be able to make links between the celebration of Easter and their own ideas about new life. .

Background understanding for teachers and parents:

This unit will encourage children to find out about the Christian festival of Easter for themselves. They will learn and discuss stories about Palm Sunday, the Last Supper, Good Friday and Easter Sunday. They will also learn the links between Easter and new life in Christian belief.
