#### **Key Knowledge/Content:**

- Families and people who care for meidentify that all families are different and to understand what makes families different.
   Even though families will be different they should all have some family values such as love, care, and respect.

# Key vocabulary with definition: Prior vocabulary:

- Parents, brothers, and sisters

## New vocabulary:

- Diverse- Including or involving people from a range of different social and ethnic backgrounds and of different genders or sexual orientations.
- Same sex parents- Parents who have the same gender and parent together.
- Blended families- A family consisting of a couple, the children they have had together, and their children from previous relationships.
- Fostering- children who are in short term care.
- Adoptive- Children who have been adopted and are no longer with their birth parents.
