History Topic: Why did the Allies win the Battle of Britain?

Year: 6 Term: Autumn 2

Key Knowledge/Content:

- Chronological understanding- Understand how the Battle of Britain affected the timeline of WW2.
- Historical enquiry- Investigate the impact of different nationalities in the Battle of Britain.
- Interpretations of the past- Understand how propaganda influenced perception of the Battle of Britain.
- Knowledge and understanding- Understand why the Battle of Britain was a turning point in WW2.
- Compare and contrast- Compare strategies used in the Battle of Britain.

Links to:

Prior learning:

To look at what it was like to be a child living in the UK during World War 2.

Future learning:

To understand how war, including World War 2, affected our local area.

Key vocabulary with definition: Prior vocabulary:

- Bombs- Weapons used to cause a larger scale destruction.
- Population- How many people are there in a particular place.
- Propaganda- Items or materials used to influence people's opinion.
- Blitz- A time period in WW2 where bombs were dropped over UK cities.
- Air raid sirens- Loud sirens which were sounded when enemy planes were incoming.

New vocabulary:

- RAF- The UK air force.
- Spitfire- A single pilot fighter plane used by the RAF in the Battle of Britain.
- Luftwaffe- The German air force.
- Radar- Radio systems used in the UK during the Battle of Britain, which could pick up sound vibrations.
- Air raid- An attack from the sky, often using bombs.
- Winston Churchill- The Prime Minister of the UK during WW2 and the Battle of Britain.

By the end of this unit

All children can: chronologically order the events of the Battle of Britain and compare tactics used by the Allies and Axis forces during the battle.

Most children can: analyse sources about the Battle of Britain, comparing reliability, and **explain** the impact of soldiers from different nationalities during the fighting.

Some children can: discuss the impact of radar on the Battle of Britain and **explain** the present-day consequences if Germany had won WW2.

Background understanding for teachers and parents:

This unit will continue children's learning of World War II to focus in depth on the Battle of Britain. In particular, they will look at how the Battle became a turning point and led to victory by the Allied forces.
